INC. VILLAGE OF EAST WILLISTON
REGULAR MEETING
MONDAY, JUNE 13, 2022

Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of East Williston was held on Monday, June 13, 2022 at 7:30 pm at the Village Hall, 2 Prospect Street, East Williston, New York.

There were present: Mayor Bonnie L.S. Parente, Trustees Raffaella Dunne, James Iannone, James Lark, Anthony Gallo, Village Clerk Marie L. Haunser, Village Attorney Jeffrey Blinkoff.

Also present: Lucie Decsi, Henry Yuen, Michael Guglielmo, Mitchell Pitnick, Eswar Sivaraman.

The meeting commenced with a public hearing to consider a local law amending Article XV, Section 160-63 of the Village Code entitled "Trees".

A verbatim transcript of said public hearing is on file in the office of the village clerk.

On the motion of Trustee Lark, seconded by Trustee Iannone, and with Mayor Parente, and Trustees Dunne, Iannone, Lark and Gallo all voting "aye", the Board approved the minutes of the regular meeting of May 9, 2022.

On the motion of Trustee Dunne, seconded by Trustee Gallo, and with Mayor Parente and Trustees Dunne, Iannone, Lark and Gallo all voting "aye", the Board approved the minutes of the agenda meeting of May 31, 2022.

On the motion of Mayor Parente, seconded by Trustee Gallo, and with Trustees Iannone, Lark and Gallo all voting "aye", the Board unanimously approved the abstract of claims for May 2022 (20210619 - 20210646).

TRUSTEE REPORTS

MAYOR BONNIE L.S. PARENTE

Mayor Parente recapped the special events of the last month.

The Mayor thanked the East Williston Fire Department for their participation in the Memorial Day parade and ceremony.

Carla Strauss was presented with the Mayor's Award for 2022.

She also thanked the Boy Scouts, Trustees Lark, Gallo and Iannone for their help, as well as Sharon Piscopia for organizing the 5K run.

The annual Tent Party on the Green took place on Saturday, June 4th, and “Doggiepalooza” took place on June 5th. Twenty-eight dogs participated in the judging event.

The First Annual East Williston Car Show took place on May 14th, and was a great success.

DEPUTY MAYOR/TRUSTEE RAFFAELA DUNNE

Deputy Mayor Dunne stated that the Library’s Summer Reading Program will kick off on June 23rd.

The Recreation Committee is on summer hiatus, but they are starting to plan the fall tent party for late September.

The village-wide tag sale will take place on Saturday, September 17th with no rain date.

TRUSTEE JAMES IANNONE

The Village Justice Court for May 2022 reported 20 parking violations, no moving or village code violations \$1455.00 total fines collected with \$211.00 in New York State surcharges.

The East Williston Seniors will meet on Thursday, June 16, 2022 at 1:00pm. Sandwiches and dessert will be served.

TRUSTEE JAMES LARK

Trustee Lark stated that the East Williston Little League will be starting the travel baseball and softball. He further stated that the championship game will take place on June 14th at Devlin Field, and the Majors will take place on June 15th at Sagamore Field.

Trustee Lark noted that public works employee Nicholas Ammann obtained the rank of Eagle Scout in Troop 45 this past weekend.

TRUSTEE ANTHONY GALLO

Trustee Gallo presented the East Williston Fire Department report for May 2022. There was a total 11 calls; six EMS calls and five general alarms.

Trustee Gallo noted that National Grid had completed odorization of the new gas line on the north side of Roslyn Road, however, there still needs to be a check of the connection under the actual intersection, going south.

VILLAGE CLERK MARIE L. HAUSNER

The police report for April 2022 noted three auto accidents, six aided cases, no reports of burglary, robbery or criminal mischief. No moving violations and one parking violation was issued.

Building Department report for May 2022:

The Mayor opened the meeting to residents.

Mr. Guglielmo stated that the temporary plates on Roslyn Road installed by National Grid are haphazardly placed and uneven, causing loud noise when vehicles travel over them.

Mayor Parente stated that she will contact National Grid to see what they can do to remediate the problem.

There being no further business, on the motion of Trustee Gallo, seconded by Trustee Iannone, the meeting was adjourned at 9:39 pm.
