MONDAY, MAY 11, 2020

Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of East Williston was held on Monday, April 6, 2020 at 7:30 p.m. at the Village Hall, 2 Prospect Street, East Williston, New York.

By Executive Order 202.1 from of the Governor of the State of New York, the hearing was held remotely by a Webex conference hosted by the Village of East Williston. A verbatim transcript of said proceedings are annexed to these minutes.

On the motion of Trustee Dunne, seconded by Trustee Siciliano, and with Mayor Parente and Trustees Siciliano, Iannone, Dunne and Lark all voting "aye", the Board approved the minutes of a conference call of March 23, 2020.

On the motion of Trustee Iannone, seconded by Trustee Lark, and with Mayor Parente and Trustees Siciliano, Iannone, Dunne and Lark all voting "aye" the Board approved the minutes of the Webex meeting of April 6, 2020.

On the motion of Trustee Lark, seconded by Trustee Siciliano, and with Mayor Parente and Trustees Siciliano, Iannone, Dunne and Lark voting "aye", the Board approved the abstracts for April 2020 claim numbers: 20190580 - 20190618.

TRUSTEES REPORTS:

TRUSTEE JAMES IANNONE

Trustee Iannone reported that the East Williston Fire Department responded to eight calls during the month of April 2020. No 9A (emergency calls), five general alarms and three mutual aid calls.

The Fire Department installation dinner has been postponed due to the Covid-19 virus.

Also due to the pandemic, all events for the East Williston Senior Group have been cancelled until further notice.

MAYOR BONNIE L.S. PARENTE

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-15 A RESOLUTION AWARDDING A BID FOR SANITATION SERVICES TO MEADOW CARTING CORP. FOR A THREE YEAR PERIOD, RENEWABLE IN ONE YEAR INTERVALS, FOR FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JUNE 1, 2020 AT A COST FOR THE FIRST YEAR OF \$385,440.00.

On the motion of Mayor Parente seconded by Trustee Siciliano and with Mayor Parente, and Trustees Siciliano, Iannone, Dunne and Lark all voting "aye", the Board awarded a bid for sanitation services to Meadow Carting Corp. for a three year period, renewable in one year intervals, for fiscal year commencing June 1, 2020 at a cost for the first year of \$385,440.00..

TRUSTEE REPORTS

TRUSTEE CHRISTOPHER A. SICILIANO

Trustee Siciliano stated that public works employees James Bailey and Simon Blanco have been alternating working hours to ensure roads, parks and Village properties stay in order.

Trustee Siciliano addressed recent reports of rusty water, as someone opened a fire hydrant without permission.

Public Works will be contracting with a company to clean out storm drains to alleviate flooding problems in certain areas.

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-16 A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE INSTALLATION OF PLEXIGLASS BARRIERS AT THE FRONT COUNTER OF THE VILLAGE OFFICE AND THE CIRCULATION DESK AT THE LIBRARY AT COSTS OF \$2,125 AND \$2,695 RESPECTIVELY.

On the motion of Mayor Parente seconded by Trustee Lark and with Mayor Parente, and Trustees Siciliano, Iannone, Dunne and Lark all voting "aye", the Board approved the installation of plexiglass barriers at the front counter of the Village Office and the Library circulation desk at cost of \$2,125 and \$2,695 respectively.

Due to the pandemic and gathering restrictions, the Library has been closed and all activities have been cancelled until further notice. They are however doing virtual book clubs, and other activities for residents to log into for participation.

TRUSTEE RAFFAELA DUNNE

Trustee Dunne had no reports of Recreation or Beautification Committee as all activities have been put on hold for the time being. The Memorial Day 5K race, tent party and garage sale have all been cancelled.

She noted that the Department of Public Works has continued to clean up and plant in the area to keep the Village look nice.

Mayor Parente added that the Village may need to forego the yard sale this year because of Covid-19.

Trustee Dunne noted that the activities of the Teen Safety/Recreation Committee is also on hold.

TRUSTEE JAMES LARK

Trustee Lark stated that the Justice Court report for April 2020 reported 27 parking violations, no moving violations and no village ordinance violations were issued in April. Total fines collected were \$1,000.00 with \$25 in New York State surcharges.

The East Williston Little League season has been cancelled. They are looking forward to the fall season.

VILLAGE CLERK MARIE HAUSNER

Due to executive order of the Governor about construction, no building permits were issued in April 2020.

The Nassau County Police Department report for March 2020 had no reports of auto accidents, eight aided cases, no reports of burglary, robbery, larceny or criminal mischief. No parking violations were issued and four parking violations were issued.

Water bills are now due and payable. Any bill not paid by April 15, 2020 will be re-levied onto the tax bill with a surcharge of \$100.

Mayor Parente added that the Governor has not extended the Village tax payment deadline of July 1st. She noted that she, along with other village mayors signed a petition requesting that he do so, but have not yet received word back from his office at this time.

The Mayor opened the meeting to residents.

No residents had comments.

There being no further business, on the motion of Trustee Siciliano, seconded by Trustee Iannone, the meeting was adjourned at 8:25 pm.

MAYOR PARENTE: We're going to call the meeting to order.

I think we should start with the pledge. I'll stand up.

(Whereupon, the pledge of allegiance was said.)

MAYOR PARENTE: Can I have a motion to approve the minutes of the conference call meeting of March 23rd, 2020? I don't know that if I have seen the official minutes, but I saw that the recording is available. The minutes are available.

Do I have a motion to approve?

TRUSTEE DUNNE: I'll make that motion.

MAYOR PARENTE: Trustee Dunne. Could I have a second?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I'll second that, Mayor.

MAYOR PARENTE: Deputy Mayor Siciliano. And the Webex meeting of April 6th, 2020.

TRUSTEE IANNONE: I'll make that

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motion.

MAYOR PARENTE: Trust Iannone.

Do I have a Second?

TRUSTEE DUNNE: I'll second.

MAYOR PARENTE: Trustee Dunne.

All in favor?

TRUSTEE LARK: Aye.

TRUSTEE DUNNE: Aye.

TRUSTEE IANNONE: Aye.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Aye.

MAYOR PARENTE: Aye.

And motion to approve the
abstract of April 2020?

TRUSTEE DUNNE: I'll make the
motion.

MAYOR PARENTE: Trustee Dunne.
Do I have a second?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I'll
second that.

MAYOR PARENTE: Deputy Mayor
Siciliano.

All in favor?

TRUSTEE LARK: Aye.

TRUSTEE DUNNE: Aye.

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TRUSTEE IANNONE: Aye.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Aye.

MAYOR PARENTE: Aye. Thank you.

Fire department report, Trustee Iannone?

TRUSTEE IANNONE: Yes, I have it. For the month ending of in April -- ending in April, we had eight total calls. No 9a calls, three aided calls and no general alarms. It was a quiet month. I thank all the residents doing what they can to stay safe. Otherwise, that's my report.

And I think the only other thing it may have come up at a prior meeting that the installment dinner which was scheduled for last week or this week has been pushed back under the circumstances.

MAYOR PARENTE: And I think they are doing things smart, and they are going to combine it with their holiday party?

TRUSTEE IANNONE: Yes, in

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December.

MAYOR PARENTE: I think that's a great idea. Thank you, Trustee Iannone.

Now, do I have a resolution to approve the resolution contract with Meadow Carting for June 2020 to May 31, 2020? And while I will want to move forward with the resolution this evening, when we contact them, I do want to talk about several continuing Village resident complaints before we actually send them the approved contract.

I'm sure that's okay to do, right, Counselor?

MR. BLINKOFF: So in effect looking to allow them to operate in satisfactory compliance with Meadow?

MAYOR PARENTE: Yes. I'll make the motion.

Do I have a second to approve the contract under those terms?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I'll

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second that, Mayor.

MAYOR PARENTE: Deputy Mayor
Siciliano. All in favor?

TRUSTEE LARK: Aye.

TRUSTEE DUNNE: Aye.

TRUSTEE IANNONE: Aye.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Aye.

MAYOR PARENTE: Aye. Thank you.
And Trustee, I'm sorry, Deputy Mayor
Siciliano, your report.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Thank
you, Mayor. Good evening, everyone.
Just a few things to update. DPW has
been working everyday. They are
alternating. Sometimes they are doing
different areas in the Village to
maintain it. We are just waiting for
the governor to let us know what's
going on until we can go back full-time
to work.

I want bring up also May is the
month we also do a fire hydrant
flushing. We have to discuss how we
want to do that. We have had some

2 residents complain about rusty water.
3 We can do the hydrant flushing in May
4 if the Board would like that.

5 MAYOR PARENTE: I think we should
6 have a brief discussion right now on
7 this. Definitely continue the hydrant
8 flushing.

9 A couple of weeks ago we had
10 residents in areas that don't typically
11 don't get.

12 Brown water over by Roslyn Road,
13 we were never able to figure out why
14 for a very short period of time they
15 had some discoloration in their water.
16 It seemed to go away as quickly as it
17 started.

18 The very following day, there was
19 discolored water reported in the
20 southwest quadrant mostly, maybe a
21 little bit of the southeast quadrant.
22 And it appeared that was filling from
23 one of the pumper trucks at the fire
24 department. That typically does not
25 create discolored water, but it appears

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that it might have this time because during COVID-19 and the New York clause, our firefighters have not been doing regular training on the hydrants so that hydrant was dormant.

Deputy Mayor Siciliano and Trustee Iannone, is that correct? Is that why we have seen that?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: We haven't used that hydrant in two months. The fellows have used it for the street sweeper. They use that. But they haven't been out that much with that also. That could be a possibility.

MAYOR PARENTE: So when we do this, we are going to want to notify our residents that they may experience discolored water in greater numbers with a greater intent than they might have a year ago, because we have been not using the water hydrants. So keep that in mind before we let the residents know.

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2 And I want to, once again,
3 communicate to the residents. I want
4 to make sure they get -- Marie, you
5 have been great at this. It may be
6 three notifications so that if you
7 missed one e-mail, you get the second
8 one. If you miss the second one, you
9 get the third.

10 THE CLERK: Okay.

11 MAYOR PARENTE: Just as much
12 possible to prevent someone from
13 preventing feeding their child dirty
14 water in pasta or giving a child a bath
15 in dirty water.

16 THE CLERK: We will do that.

17 TRUSTEE IANNONE: Now also
18 because everyone's home. We used to
19 schedule these when people are at work
20 which wouldn't inconvenience somebody.
21 But now that everyone's home, you know,
22 we really should communicate that,
23 because that's one point.

24 THE CLERK: And send out fliers
25 to everyone and get that out.

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MAYOR PARENTE: Chris, are you going to let us know the date?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Yes, that's what I wanted to discuss. I'm working with Marie to get out how much time, Bonnie, to give residents notice. We want to send those fires out, and I don't know how long it will take for the printer also.

MAYOR PARENTE: That's a problem, yes. Okay. All right.

And Deputy Mayor Siciliano, did you have a library report?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I just wanted to bring up up one other thing, please, with DPW. I would like to start cleaning out the drains this year. They say you are supposed to be pretty bad with storms, and we have a list of drains that we can start to clean out so we can get ahead of the curve if we get these downpours and these storms. So I thought about that also.

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MAYOR PARENTE: What does that entail?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: They suck out the catch basins. So really what we have to do is we have to wait until we have dry weather because you don't want to clean them out when it's raining, because then you would be sucking up the water, and we want to make it when it's dry and then get the muck out of the drain so they drain better, the street drains.

MAYOR PARENTE: Do we do that completely on our own, or is there a contractor?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: It's a contractor.

MAYOR PARENTE: I agree, we definitely should get that moving. Anything else on that?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: No. That's pretty much of the DPW. I got the got Plexiglass numbers. Do you want to do that now?

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MAYOR PARENTE: Perfect.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Really what it is, Mayor, is the breakdown of two for the library. It was \$2,695, and I'll explain everything, and the Village office was \$2,125.

So basically to do the library and the Village office was \$4,820. That's to do both. And what we did was with the rolling cart, that's going to serve two purposes in the library. When you go into the library and you go into the office, and there's an entrance there. So with the rolling cart, it will protect them from the side. And if the library staff decides they don't want to let anybody into the library, they can push that cart to the front door and receive books and give out books that way. And it will be the same thing with the Village office. So this way it's like a double protection for the staff.

And what it is is it entails,

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2 it's a permanent, but it's not
3 permanent. They are not going drill
4 into the stonework on the top of the
5 desk, but they will clamp everything.
6 So everything is going to be free with
7 the Plexiglass. It will be all safe.
8 It won't fall on anybody. That's the
9 whole thing. It's a permanent as
10 permanent as we want it.

11 MAYOR PARENTE: Do you have a
12 picture of what that looks like? I
13 mean that sounds like so much more
14 expensive than what I imagined.

15 DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I know.
16 Unfortunately, what it is, it's
17 Plexiglass, but it's a frame around it,
18 an aluminum frame. So it like supports
19 on the counter. And it entails the
20 door going into the Village office
21 also, really both doors. They have to
22 put a piece of Plexiglas, a panic bar
23 on that in the inside so people don't
24 push on the Plexiglass and a handle on
25 the outside.

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MAYOR PARENTE: And you explained a little bit about how it gets attached. I'm envisioning that maybe some day not needing that. So is this a permanent structure?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: No, no, it can be taken apart, but it's as permanent as long as we want it to be permanent. They really drilling holes into the top. What it is they are clamping everything. This way, no one can push it over.

MAYOR PARENTE: But does it appear nice-looking?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: It's going to be a metal frame around Plexiglass. So -- and then, of course, it's going to have an opening.

You know what, in the office, there is a picture. It's just basically it's a Plexiglass with a metal frame around it.

MAYOR PARENTE: So it's permanent, but it's not damaging?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Correct, yes, right.

MAYOR PARENTE: All right. And how high does it go?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: It's going to be I believe from the floor to the top, 72 inches.

MAYOR PARENTE: And does that price include the cart they are putting it on when they are putting it on the cart?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: They are putting it on our cart, and it will mount onto the desk in the Village office, and it's going to have side panels on it so it can protect people from the sides. It's going to have a piece of Plexiglas on top of the half door with the panic door and the bar and the handle. And then in the library, it's going to be cut around that whole desk area. So it's going to be all enclosed.

MAYOR PARENTE: Okay. Anybody

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else have any questions about this while we are talking about it? Okay. Do you have any other report?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: That's it, Mayor. I didn't realize about that meeting that you had that. I would have explained this at that meeting.

MAYOR PARENTE: That's okay. It was really you didn't miss anything. It was just an outlining of what they want. You did not miss a thing.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I would have explained this. That's basically it.

MAYOR PARENTE: Okay. Perfect.

Trustee Iannone, did you decide on a report? Are the seniors doing anything, or are they keeping in touch?

TRUSTEE IANNONE: I have no report, Mayor. I'm not sure. I had to get off the video camera because my camera was going to die. I have no report right now. Obviously, I'm sure as soon as things come back to normal,

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2 they would like to meet again. But
3 they are the most vulnerable
4 population. I think that we should
5 really proceed with extra caution even
6 once the restrictions are lifted.

7 MAYOR PARENTE: If you can do us
8 a favor, Trustee Iannone, is it Carla
9 who would be your main contact?

10 TRUSTEE IANNONE: Yes.

11 MAYOR PARENTE: Touch base with
12 Carla and see if there's anything they
13 need from us. Maybe they need
14 something because there are still
15 people contacting us, the Village,
16 asking if they can volunteer, if
17 anybody needs shopping.

18 I touched base with Carla at the
19 very outset. But if you can touch base
20 with her now to see if anybody needs
21 anything.

22 TRUSTEE IANNONE: Happy to do it.

23 MAYOR PARENTE: Under the library
24 report, I want to know from what I see
25 the library is still quite active.

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They are doing online book clubs. They are making reading recommendations. They do a wonderful program what first responders in our area and first line workers seemed to handle just to let them know everybody was thinking of them. I think the library's been pretty active. I want to make sure the Village residents know that. I think that's good.

Trustee Dunne?

TRUSTEE DUNNE: Well, recreation committee, we spoke and made a decision not to do the pay raise. So we're potentially looking at doing something maybe for another day. The tent parties are also all delayed, and a garage sale is already planned for September rather than spring this year. There's really not any activity going on right now.

And then the same with the education. DPW has been handling all the open spaces on their own. There

1
2 hasn't been any volunteers working with
3 them right now.

4 MAYOR PARENTE: Okay. Speaking
5 of the yard sale, if we start to open
6 up in the fall and people start to use
7 the fall for their graduation parties
8 and everything else, we may need to
9 forego the yard sale this year.

10 And I don't know how everybody
11 feels about that. That includes May,
12 June and July.

13 TRUSTEE DUNNE: Don't we also
14 need 60 days to do the resolution in
15 advance? That would mean we have to
16 know I guess in June really if it was
17 even possible to do it.

18 MAYOR PARENTE: We might not be
19 able to do it, and it might not be
20 recommended this year.

21 Make sure that the recreation
22 committee understands that before they
23 start planning too much it might not
24 happen.

25 Anything else, Trustee Dunne?

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TRUSTEE DUNNE: No. The other thing I would say all of those plans obviously are on hold. They had planned to do all of those programs, but obviously everything's on hold. We will revisit that in the fall.

MAYOR PARENTE: So if you want to reach out to them to see if they have any ideas for now. Maybe they want to do a little video about staying safe, social distancing. Maybe they want to put something out. We would be happy to do that for them.

TRUSTEE DUNNE: Okay.

MAYOR PARENTE: Do you want to talk to them just to keep them active?

TRUSTEE DUNNE: I will.

MAYOR PARENTE: Great. Trustee Lark?

TRUSTEE LARK: Yes, Mayor. Little league as everyone's probably aware, the season's been canceled. We are going to try to do summer baseball if it is permitted, and they are

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looking forward to the fall season.

With respect to the court, there wasn't court held. There were 27 parking violations issued and \$1,025 collected.

MAYOR PARENTE: Great, thank you. And I know you are also handling the scouts and some things we are doing for Memorial Day. I appreciate that.

Marie, do you have a police report for us?

THE CLERK: Yes, I do. I have the police report from the month of March. There were no auto accidents reported; eight aided cases. No reports of burglary, robbery or larceny and no criminal mischief. There were no moving violations issued and four parking violations. There were no building permits issued during the month of April because of the governor's executive order.

We do note that I want to make sure the residents were aware the water

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bills were due April 30th. Any bill that remains unpaid by the 14th will be re-levied onto the taxes. We have no choice about that, because we have to start to get the tax bills out. They will be mailed on June 1st.

MAYOR PARENTE: Marie, how are we looking? Are we more or less than usual in terms of collection, in terms of how many people have paid?

THE CLERK: We are about the same as in past years.

MAYOR PARENTE: And a handful of people have asked for extensions for hardship during COVID-19, and I believe we granted one or two?

THE CLERK: That's the case, there is a handful, not very many.

MAYOR PARENTE: If the resident tells us they have a hardship, we believe they have a hardship.

THE CLERK: Yes, that is correct.

MAYOR PARENTE: Now, the tax bills, you bring up a good point.

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2 So Jeff Blinkoff, you are still
3 here, right? I have been reading some
4 NYCOM reports, New York Conference of
5 Mayors, and we are not permitted yet or
6 at all, the governor has not allowed us
7 to extend the tax deadlines.

8 MR. BLINKOFF: Correct.

9 MAYOR PARENTE: And the governor
10 has not had it on his radar. So they
11 had asked for petitions to be signed by
12 villages which I did, just electronic
13 signature so that if they do decide, we
14 are on this saying they do support
15 allowing to give our residents
16 additional time for taxes.

17 I received an e-mail today they
18 weren't accepting any signatures on the
19 petition unless they were actually from
20 the Mayor herself. So I did re-sign
21 that petition to make sure it was
22 coming from me. They weren't accepting
23 it coming from clerks or treasurers.

24 I really want to make you aware I
25 signed that petition, but I am fully

1
2 aware it's not going to go anywhere.
3 At this late stage, the governor is not
4 likely to grant any extension. But I
5 did sign it in the event that an
6 extension can be granted.

7 Anything more on that, Jeff, that
8 you're aware?

9 MR. BLINKOFF: No, Mayor.

10 MAYOR PARENTE: And was your
11 understanding the same?

12 MR. BLINKOFF: I have heard
13 nothing different. The other village I
14 work with also sends in a separate
15 letter about the same issue because
16 they received a similar response which
17 you can't extend the tax deadline
18 unless the state allows that, and the
19 state has now allowed it.

20 MAYOR PARENTE: And the update
21 was that the request had come directly
22 from the chief executive of the
23 Village. Okay. I think that's
24 everything.

25 Does anyone who is listening have

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2 anything to say to this portion of the
3 meeting? I'm not hearing anything.
4 You might be on mute if you are trying
5 to speak. You are not? Okay. So no
6 one's speaking, right? I'm hoping that
7 no one is muted improperly and trying
8 to speak.

9 Anybody else have anything else
10 they want to add this evening?

11 MR. BLINKOFF: I just had a
12 question. When Deputy Mayor Siciliano
13 mentioned the Plexiglas, was the Board
14 approving it, or was it just being
15 considered for the pricing?

16 MAYOR PARENTE: If it needs to be
17 approved, I make the motion to approve.
18 Do I have a second?

19 TRUSTEE LARK: Second.

20 MAYOR PARENTE: Trustee Lark
21 seconded that. All in favor?

22 TRUSTEE LARK: Aye.

23 TRUSTEE DUNNE: Aye.

24 TRUSTEE IANNONE: Aye.

25 DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: Aye.

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MAYOR PARENTE: Aye. That's approved. It was a little more pricey than I expected.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: You are right. So did I.

MAYOR PARENTE: I'm a little bulled over that it's going to be \$4,000. But if it's going to save lives or protect people.

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I was surprised, too. But they had reached out to someone else, and they weren't going to do any custom work. They were going to put sheets up. So we were right the first time.

MAYOR PARENTE: Now, Mike, our treasurer is not on today because he had a death in his family. But Marie, if you could make sure this expenditure gets added to our eventual FEMA request?

THE CLERK: Absolutely. And we are working on that now which isn't very much. We are working to get those

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bills together and get them out to
FEMA.

MAYOR PARENTE: Okay. I think
there was one other thing I wanted to
say, and I can't remember what it was.
But okay, anybody else?

Motion to close the meeting?

DEPUTY MAYOR SICILIANO: I'll
make that motion, Mayor.

MAYOR PARENTE: Deputy Mayor
Siciliano.

TRUSTEE IANNONE: I'll second it,
Mayor.

MAYOR PARENTE: Trustee Iannone
seconded it.

All in favor?
